# Starting Over Takes Courage

Despite the challenges brought by the pandemic, we continued to offer hope and healing.

OVID-19 continued to challenge us all this past year as we struggled to manage lockdowns, shifting restrictions and the impact of the pandemic on our community.

All types of violence against women and girls has intensified, especially intimate partner violence. More families have been facing homelessness and it has been increasingly difficult for refugee families to seek – and find – safe harbour.

While most of the world lived virtually, our frontline staff were present in real time, and our supportive community continued to stand up and speak for those whose voices are seldom heard.

It takes courage to leave an abusive relationship. It takes courage to keep a family together. And it takes courage to hold out a hand to the families who turn to Red Door for comfort, caring and support.

## Red Door Family Shelter

Thanks to our circle of support, we opened the doors of our new, purpose-built family shelter.

n June 17, 2021, with the help of Mayor John Tory and Councillor Paula Fletcher (Toronto-Danforth), we virtually cut the ribbon on the new and purposebuilt Red Door Family Shelter, an innovative shelter incorporated into a private condo development in Leslieville.

Families stay in suites with a bedroom and private bathroom. Some suites have a connecting door so large families can stay together. The finishes – bathroom tiles, and sinks – are the same as those in the condo next door.

At the entrance to the shelter, a powerful mural featuring the Seven Grandfather Teachings celebrates love, respect, wisdom, bravery, honesty, humility and truth, the

The mural was created by Philip Cote of Moose Deer Point First Nation, an Indigenous artist, Young Spiritual Elder, activist, educator, historian and Ancestral Knowledge Keeper.

Each animal represents a teaching, and these teaching tools aid in the survival of the community because they share the same beliefs: an abiding respect for Mother Earth and all living things.

Our new home would not have been possible without the courage of our community – you cheered for us, advocated for us, volunteered for us and embraced us as an integral part of the neighbourhood.

The ongoing support from residents is so moving. I hope this new, innovative model will also be used to create inclusive and welcoming communities across the City.


Alia helps families set life goals and develops plans contributing to success. She also links families to the community support services that will help them realize their goals.



# The Face of Homelessness

A family calls for help.

hen you think about homelessness, do you see children as part of the picture? Family homelessness is a hidden crisis. More and more families need emergency shelter – on any given night, 60 per cent of our residents are children – and the impact of COVID-19 has made the issue even more critical.

Meet Ameena\*, Bashir\* and their six children.

In January 2020, they flew to Pakistan to visit family. In March, with COVID-19 fast becoming a global pandemic, they frantically tried to book a flight home, finally arriving in Canada in July, 2020. Ameena and Bashir couldn't work while they were away, and so couldn't pay their rent; they lost their home and all their belongings and returned with nowhere to live.

Ameena, who was expecting her sixth child in early 2021, called 211 and the family found sanctuary at Red Door Family Shelter.

"We stayed at Red Door for almost eight months," Ameena says. "The staff understood our situation and supported us in so many ways. We had nothing. Red Door gave us clothes and shoes and hygiene products – everything we needed to live.

"Maria helped me enroll my kids in school and made sure they had school supplies. It was difficult during the pandemic – the kids had classes online – but they got help with homework from the Red Door staff.

"When I had my baby, only my husband could come to the hospital. But it was OK because my kids were at Red Door in a safe place while he was gone, so I didn't worry.

"When we brought our daughter back to Red Door the staff was so supportive. I was worried about having to buy things for a new baby during COVD – there were long lineups at the stores and things were so expensive. But Red Door gave us everything we needed for the baby – clothes, diapers, blankets, a crib, a bath tub...we are just so grateful for their care and their love.


"We are in our own home now, thanks to Tasha, and Maria helped the kids enroll in a new school. We had nothing when we left Red Door but they gave us everything we needed to start over.

"We are trying hard to make a better life and are so hopeful for the future."
Nine-year-old Geeta thrived at Red Door.
The family's caseworker helped her and her brother and sister to enroll in a new school, made sure they had school supplies, and offered homework help.
And of course, lots of activities!

"Because of COVID, we had online learning and we got a lot of help when we needed it.

"I really liked Christmas time. We made cards and door decorations and a gingerbread house.

"My best memory? I got my sister!
Before she was born, I was the youngest;
now I am a big sis!"





## Children and Youth Programs

We know that helping children overcome painful and frightening experiences support their growth into strong, capable and resilient adults.

Our after school and evening programs offer help with homework as well as fun activities such as games, visits to the library or a local park, and arts and crafts for children of all ages.

Seminars and workshops for teenagers and parents cover a wide range of topics designed to provide youth with critical decision-making tools, and help parents support their children through this difficult time. We also offer homework support and social activities.

Tasha supports families to secure permanent housing.

"We can't use a 'one size fits all' approach to support our clients. Each family's experience is different. What is the same: their resilience. 'I never thought I would be in this situation,' they tell me, 'living in a shelter with my children'. But they have showed me their strength and endurance again and again, and I have learned my own resilience from them.

"If I could make one wish come true it would be for more landlords to believe in second chances, to understand that a person's past does not define who they are today. Sometimes our clients may have bad credit and this becomes a huge barrier to obtaining permanent housing. However, landlords do not see what's happening behind the scenes, the amazing work done by every person at Red Door to help our clients become housing ready. The growth I see in clients, from the first time they walk through the shelter doors to when they move into their new home is truly incredible and makes me proud to be a part of the Red Door team."

It's their safety, their separation, their new life – everything is changing for them and I provide them with stability and consistency."



## **Coldest Night** of the Year

On February 20, 2021, Stephanie Porter and the Masked Marchers came together virtually to walk in support of Red Door in Coldest Night of the Year, Canada's national fundraising walk for homelessness.

The Masked Marchers were the Number One team, raising \$11,011.09 and Stephanie Porter was the top walker, raising \$5,481.09.

Thirty-eight teams - 175 walkers - walked for Red Door, raising **\$108,238** – and our goal was \$75,000!

## Changing Lives




